QR Code

WoSP has been allocated a QR CODE in this battle against Covid. It has been placed on the noticeboard above the registration book.

So on entry to the workshop sign-in as normal PLUS scan the QR Code. This action will assist contract tracers in tracking any members who may have innocently been at a Covid hotspot.

Basically, a QR code works in the same way as a barcode at the supermarket. It is a machine scannable image that can instantly be read using a Smartphone camera. Every QR code consists of a number of black squares and dots which represent certain pieces of information like the identification of the place you have visited.



an app & there are some phones too old to load an app. As more & more stores have a QR Code where you are expected to scan it is best to load the relevant app to your phone. If you are unsure how to do this seek assistance. Once you have the app loaded the process is quite simple.
