#### **Donations**

Hillview Quarries have made a donation to the club to be spent of lathe tools and chisels. The committee is considering removing the existing chisel racks and replacing them with box sets. The box sets would be stored in a cupboard and have to be signed out and then back in.

This approach would prevent chisels falling out of the racks and ensure they are sharp when you get them so no member would need to sharpen the chisels.

There is a preference in the club to use battery power tools. So recently Bunnings was asked for a donation of some battery power tools. Bunnings provided some and the club purchased additional Ozito batteries, drill and impact driver. WoSP would like to thank Bunnings for their donation.

#### **Improved Processes**

The committee is always considering member safety.

- High on the priority list is to install a brake on the large band saw.
- \* After a recent accident on the table saw the committee instigated a "buddy system" and want to see 2 people using the table saw in partnership. One person to push the timber into the cut and the other to pull the timber away from the blade. The table saw must be turned off after each cut of timber. Each person must be a lookout for each other's safety. Session leaders will encourage this approach at each session.

#### Snippets and Offcuts

- \* The external dust extractor has been housed. Now the club is awaiting a suitable day for council to test the effectiveness of the housing.
- Recently the council have had contractors dig up sections of the car par park to determine the reason for the surface subsiding. Surprisingly the sinking has been caused by a number of car bodies previously buried up to 30 years ago. The cars have been extracted and the area filled.
- \* Thanks to Dennis Conner and Scott Hanley for installing a gate to the car park. This gate will be locked to avoid some members of the public using the car park as a race track. Members of WoSP and the radio club will have the ability to unlock the gate.
- Scott Hanley has used Facebook to sell a lot of equipment not required by the club. Scott has also retrieved a large amount of timber from a deceased estate. There is a range of wood species available to members. Please respect the prices marked and give the money to the session leader.

#### Answer to last months puzzler

Djarilmari in Denmark WA.

Djarilmari was established in 1983 and take pride in collecting timber in ways that conserve the environment. Timber is salvaged from farm clearance, road construction sites and sourced under license from government regulated forest areas. Long term sustainability of the resource is a priority.

#### Intarsia ~ Cathy Wise

Not many members use or know much about the scroll saw so it was refreshing to have Cathy Wise, International Intarsia artist, demonstrate her skills with Intarsia and the scroll saw.

Cathy designs the patterns and publishes them in a number of very descriptive books. The books provide tips to shape, glue, finish and how to attach small spot inlays. Each project is designed to be 3 dimensional using different timbers for colour, and effect. These timbers are often 50mm thick.

In outlining her qualifications, Cathy showed pictures of some amazing murals, some of which have taken up to 10 months to complete.

In preparation for her Australia tour Cathy designed patterns for a variety of Australian animals.

In demonstrating making a platypus she explained her techniques some of which follow:

- Glue pattern to sticky paper then the paper to the selected timbers.
- Uses a highlighter where different timbers will join to identify more areas requiring more careful cutting.
- There are 2 layouts on the pattern. One is for the project work and the other for the base plate.
- The use of an accelerator and CA glue to join pieces
- \* The use of a dowel to position overlays
- The No 5 blade is best used in the scroll saw
- Explained some of the scroll saw blades and their uses, eg. the
  - reverse blade is used to ensure there is no tear at the bottom of the cut.
- \* Explained the difference between fret saw art and intarsia
- Besides the scroll saw, the bobbin sander seems essential.

Cathy made the platypus with such speed the audience was blown away. It is exciting watching a skilled expert. Whether members take up the art or not she had lots of useful tips that

could be used in other areas.

If members are interested in learning more about Intarsia contact John Hanley or Anne Miller as the Woodpecker is sure they would help set up an Intarsia group.
