Versatile Centre Gauge

Drill a snug fitting hole for a pencil in the middle of a ½" x ½" stick. Then drill 2 smaller holes for 10d nails an equal distance from the pencil hole. The distance between the nail holes should be a little larger than the widest section of the stock. Place the gauge over the stock & rotate it so the nails contact the sides. Draw the centre line while keeping the nails against the sides. Try it. It really works.

The "d" stands for penny, so 8d refers to an 8-penny nail, 16d to a 16-penny nail and so on. It's a way to indicate nail length, as you can see in the table below. ... Others say that the number and the "d" indicate that one 16d (3-1/2 inch) hand-forged nail cost 16 pennies.

The Right Nail for the Job

Box	Length	Diam.
10d	3	0.128
12d	3.25	0.128
16d	3.5	0.135
20d	4	0.148

WoSP History

Bert Bartlett recently provided a number of items, papers & photos relating to the club's history. These items highlight some of the club activities over the years.

The "club", as it was known, was formed in 1996 from a woodworking group run by the University of the Third Age. It met first in a school classroom then moved to a small shed on Council land. It expanded rapidly and added a garage donated by a member, but when this too became overcrowded, financial assistance was obtained from the



Mornington Peninsular Shire Council. With this money and a substantial contribution from club funds, together with members' labour, the clubhouse building was opened by the Mayor in 2003. The original sheds were re-erected as storage sheds alongside the clubhouse, and the standard of equipment & furniture was progressively upgraded. In 2006 subscription fees were \$35 & attendance fees were \$3 whereas today they are \$60 & \$4 respectively.

With the relocation of the club shortly it sounds as if history is going to repeat itself.
